I'm sure that many of you are enjoying the temps and lack of snow this winter. What a change from last winter when we had tons of snow and were always wondering when the next storm was going to happen and where we were going to put all the snow!

I wanted to share some numbers with you today about our hospice program. Throughout the year, we keep track of the number of patients that we serve, and average length of stay. In 2023, we served 95 patients, with 82 of those patients being admitted in 2023. With those 95 patients, 6 of those patients were either discharged (meaning they were no longer considered terminally ill per Medicare definition) or chose to revoke their hospice benefit (went off hospice of their own choosing). Hospice of Murray County was with 71 of those patients during their final journey. What a blessing it is to serve those who are dying, and our staff can help them, and their families prepare for this.

I'm going to focus on the patients that were admitted in 2023, so 82 patients. 60 of

these patients lived in Murray County, 10 were from Cottonwood, 11 from Lyon and one from Redwood. 40 were female and 42 were male.

The largest categories of terminal illness that we had in 2023 was diseases of the circulatory system such as heart failure and cerebral infarction with 23 patients, diseases of the respiratory system such as chronic respiratory failure and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease with 13 patients and Neoplasms or cancers with 19 patients.

The average length of stay was 54.64 days. When a patient is certified for hospice care, a doctor says that the patient has a terminal diagnosis that could end their life in 6 months or less. 55 days is way less than that 6-month (approximately 180 days) diagnosis. Hospice of Murray County likes to think that Hospice is not a diagnosis, but a plan of care for a diagnosis. If more doctors, patients, families, and caregivers adopt this way of thinking, hospice could be more beneficial to people in their final stages of life. Hospice does not need to be "only on the death bed." Hospice is much more than that. It is letting a person

live their days filled with quality. Filled with love. Filled with joy. Yes, there may be bumps and curves on the way, but with hospice, we can help ease those days.

The National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization reports that more than 1.5 million people received care from our nation's hospices last year.

Hospice providers can help with information about care options and choices and ensure you live as fully as possible throughout your entire life. They will make sure your loved ones receive support as well.

One of the best ways to make sure you and your loved ones benefit fully from hospice, should you ever need this care, is to talk about it before it becomes an issue.



CHALKING THE DOOR

Epiphany House Blessing (chalking the door)

The family gathers to ask God for the blessing of their home and that of those who inhabit or visit it. It is an invitation for Jesus to be a daily guest in our home, in our chores, comings and goings, our conversations, our work and games, our sorrows and joys.

A traditional way to do this is to use chalk to write on the home's entry

$$20 + C + M + B + 24$$
.

The letters C, M, B have two meanings. They are the initials of the traditional names of the three wise men: Gaspar (Caspar in Latin), Melchor and Balthasar. They are also short for the Latin words Christus mansionem benedicat, meaning "May Christ bless this house." The symbol "+" represents the cross and 2024 is the year.

Instructions for each family to bless their home

Using the blessed chalk, write on the lintel of your front door the following:

...as you recite:

The three Wise Men, Gaspar, Melchor and Balthasar followed the star of the Son of God who became a man two thousand and fifteen years ago. May the Lord bless this home and be with us during this new year. Amen.

Family Leader then offers the following prayer:

We ask you, Lord, to bless this house and all those who live in it: may there always be love, peace and forgiveness in this home; grants its inhabitants sufficiency of material goods and abundance of virtues; who are welcoming and sensitive to the needs of others; that in joy they praise you, Lord, and in sadness they seek you; at work they find the joy of your help, and in need they feel close to your comfort; when they go out, enjoy your company, and when they return, experience the joy of having you as a guest; May this house truly be a domestic church where the Word of God is light and food, and may the peace of Christ reign in his hearts until one day he arrives in your heavenly home. Through Christ our Lord. Amen

Indelible Blessing: Chalking the door of the home is a way of celebrating and literally leaving a mark on the occasion of Epiphany and God's blessing on our lives and homes.

Over time, the chalk will fade. As it does, we will let the meaning of the Latin words sink deep into our hearts and manifest itself in our words and actions: **Christus mansionem benedictat**, **"May Christ bless this house."**
